
SOCIALISATION TICK SHEET

Puppy Socialisation (9-16 weeks)

This is a key time as your puppy is most responsive to new things and needs to experience a wide variety of situations, people, noises and environments so that they develop all- important social skills for later life. Socialisation must always be positive and never scare or stress the puppy or it could have an adverse effect on your dog's learning and trigger future fears and phobias.

Overleaf is a checklist for you to work through with your puppy, of course this list does not include everything so use your judgement and try to introduce your puppy to as many new experiences, sights and sounds as possible. Make sure they are all positive experiences ideally before 17 weeks old. Whilst more is better, overwhelming your pup is not! If your puppy is older than 17 weeks, all is not lost, just progress with the list gently, making sure you reassure your puppy at every step.

Always maintain control and allow your puppy to choose his place during interaction. Watch his body language carefully for stress and calming signals. Use treats, reassurance and let your puppy stop and look and weigh up each new situation: If you are anxious your puppy will pick up on this. You should act as though it is no big deal.



Tick when you have completed each activity. You may have to visit several times before your puppy is confident with each situation.
